Irregular verbs in English, beginning with the letters g and h. Learn the verbs in their past participle form in column one. See the verbs used in context in column two.

got	Have you ever <b>got</b> a good mark in your spelling test? (get - got - <b>got</b> )
given	My mum has never <b>given</b> me a bar of chocolate. (give - gave - <b>given</b> )
gone	They have just <b>gone</b> to the park. They are there now. (go - went - <b>gone</b> )
been	I have already <b>been</b> to the park this week. (go - went - <b>been</b> )
grown	Look how tall my tomato plants have already <b>grown</b> . (grow - grew - <b>grown</b> )
had	So far today, I have <b>had</b> two cups of tea. (have - had - <b>had</b> )
heard	I have just <b>heard</b> the news. (hear - heard - <b>heard</b> )
hung	I have already <b>hung</b> the washing out. (hang - hung - <b>hung</b> )
hanged	They have already <b>hanged</b> the prisoner. (hang - hanged - <b>hanged</b> )
hidden	My sister has never <b>hidden</b> her toys from me. (hide - hid - <b>hidden</b> )
hit	She has just <b>hit</b> her head. (hit - hit - <b>hit</b> )
held	I have just <b>held</b> my newborn baby sister. (hold - held - <b>held</b> )
hurt	So far this week, I have <b>hurt</b> my knee and my elbow. (hurt - hurt - <b>hurt</b> )
