

## Spelling list: Tier 2 Words (stability - sufficient)

Tier 2 words are less common than high frequency (Tier 1) words. They are often integral to the comprehension of exam questions or core subject knowledge.

| stability       | <b>Stability</b> is the quality of being firm and unwavering.   |
| stable          | If something is <b>stable</b> , it means it is firm and unwavering.   |
| stationary      | If something is <b>stationary</b> , it means it is not moving.  |
| statistic       | A <b>statistic</b> is a piece of data that can be represented as a number.  |
| status          | Someone's <b>status</b> is their relative position within a field or society.   |
| straightforward | If something is <b>straightforward</b> , it is easy to understand.  |
| strategy        | A <b>strategy</b> is a plan of action.  |
| stress          | <b>Stress</b> is a state of mental or emotional strain.   |
| strive          | If you <b>strive</b> to do something, it means you work hard to do it.  |
| structure       | The word <b>structure</b> is used to describe the way in which the different parts of a whole are arranged to fit together. |
| style           | <b>Style</b> describes the particular way in which someone does something.  |
| submitted       | If something has been <b>submitted</b> , it means it has been entered for consideration.                                    |
| subordinate     | <b>Subordinate</b> is used to describe someone or something that is less important or lower in rank.                        |
| subsequent      | If something is <b>subsequent</b> to something else, it means it follows it in time or order.                               |
| subsidiary      | A <b>subsidiary</b> is a company that is completely controlled by another company.  |
| substitute      | If you <b>substitute</b> something, it means you replace it with something else.  |
