clergy	People who are ordained in the Christian church are called the <b>clergy</b> .
curfew	A <b>curfew</b> is a time by which people must return home.
colony	A <b>colony</b> is a country that is under the control of another country.
magistrate	A <b>magistrate</b> judges less serious cases in the court.
coroner	A <b>coroner</b> investigates deaths.
penal	If something is <b>penal</b> , it means it relates to punishment.
slum	A <b>slum</b> is a poor and overcrowded area in a city.
custodial	If something is <b>custodial</b> , it means it relates to imprisonment.
capital	The death penalty is called <b>capital</b> punishment.
punishment	The death penalty is called capital <b>punishment</b> .
corporal	Physical pain as punishment is called <b>corporal</b> punishment.
punishment	Physical pain as <b>punishment</b> is called corporal <b>punishment</b> .
deterrence	A <b>deterrence</b> is something that discourages or stops someone from doing something.
humiliation	<b>Humiliation</b> is state of being disgraced or shamed.
retribution	<b>Retribution</b> is another word for revenge.
