

## Spelling list: GCSE English Literature: Poetry 3

Key words from GCSE English Literature.

enjambment	<b>Enjambment</b> is continuing a sentence after the line breaks.
free	<b>Free</b> verse does not use any consistent rhymes, metres, or patterns.
verse	Free <b>verse</b> does not use any consistent rhymes, metres, or patterns.
iamb	An <b>iamb</b> is a metrical foot used in poetry.
quatrain	A <b>quatrain</b> is a stanza with four lines.
sestet	A <b>sestet</b> is a stanza with six lines.
octave	An <b>octave</b> is a stanza with eight lines.
rhyme	A <b>rhyme</b> scheme is the rhyming pattern used in a poem.
scheme	A rhyme <b>scheme</b> is the rhyming pattern used in a poem.
trimeter	<b>Trimeter</b> is a poetic meter which uses three metrical feet per line.
tetrameter	<b>Tetrameter</b> is a poetic meter which uses four metrical feet per line.
pentameter	<b>Pentameter</b> is a poetic meter which uses five metrical feet per line.
elegy	An <b>elegy</b> is a poem that reflects upon death or loss.
sight	A <b>sight</b> rhyme is when two words look similar but do not rhyme.
end-stopped	An <b>end-stopped</b> line is a line of poetry that ends with a punctuation mark.
volta	A <b>volta</b> is a change in direction in thought or argument.
anaphora	<b>Anaphora</b> is the repetition of a word or phrase at the beginning of each clause.
refrain	A <b>refrain</b> is a repeated verse.
