figure	A figure of speech is a word or phrase used in a non-literal sense.
speech	A figure of <b>speech</b> is a word or phrase used in a non-literal sense.
hyperbole	Hyperbole means exaggeration.
assonance	Assonance is the repetition of vowel sounds within a phrase.
imagery	Imagery is the use of visually descriptive language.
irony	<b>Irony</b> is when you say the opposite of what you mean for dramatic or humorous effect.
jargon	Specialist language is known as jargon .
superlative	A <b>superlative</b> is an adjective or adverb that describes something as being of the highest degree.
imperative	An imperative verb is an instruction or command.
euphemism	A <b>euphemism</b> is a word or sentence used in place of one that might be considered offensive.
emphasis	If you put <b>emphasis</b> on something, it means you give it importance.
emotive	<b>Emotive</b> language is language that elicits an emotional response from the reader.
language	Emotive <b>language</b> is <b>language</b> that elicits an emotional response from the reader.
onomatopoeia	<b>Onomatopoeia</b> is when a word imitates the sound of the action or thing it describes.

connotation	A <b>connotation</b> is a commonly understood association of a word or phrase.
extended	An <b>extended</b> metaphor is when an analogy extends across a literary work.
metaphor	An extended metaphor is when an analogy extends across a literary work.
