

## Spelling list: *igh* words

The *igh* spelling pattern is used to represent long /i/ sound in English. You will find this pattern in words like *high* , *sigh* , and *night* . The *igh* combination is commonly used in the middle or at the end of a word.

When spelling words with the *igh* pattern, remember that the three-letter combination replaces the single letter *i* . This helps differentiate between similar-sounding words, such as *right* and *write* . Pay attention to the *gh* because these letters are part of the spelling pattern even though they don't contribute to the sound.

high	Birds fly <b>high</b> in the sky.
sigh	The bored girl gave a loud <b>sigh</b> .
thigh	The upper part of a leg is called the <b>thigh</b> .
bright	The holly berry is <b>bright</b> red.
fight	He broke his nose in a <b>fight</b> .
flight	Our <b>flight</b> was delayed by fog.
fright	The loud bang gave me a <b>fright</b> .
knight	The <b>knight</b> carried a shield.
might	You <b>might</b> have forgotten.
night	I heard a very weird noise in the <b>night</b> .
plight	We wanted to help their <b>plight</b> .
sight	I saw a strange <b>sight</b> last night.
slight	I have a <b>slight</b> pain in my neck.
tight	My new boots are too <b>tight</b> .
delight	Linda screamed with <b>delight</b> when she opened the present.
nightmare	The child woke up crying after he had a <b>nightmare</b> .
twilight	<b>Twilight</b> is the time of day just after sunset.

highlight      White paint was used to **highlight** the detail.

height      He was at the **height** of his popularity.
