Clause	A sentence with a main clause and a subordinate clause , joined with a connective.
Cliche	It is a cliche if I say 'What goes around comes around' but it is often true.
Comma	You put a comma after each word in a list except for the.
Simile	A parallel example used to illustrate a point; operates rather like an extended simile .
Soliloquy	A soliloquy allows us into the mind of the character.
Subordinate	A sentence with a main clause and a subordinate clause, joined with a connective.
Comparison	Metaphor is an implied comparison of two unlike things, e.g. He was a lion in battle.
Conjunction	A conjunction is a word that joins other words together.
Consonant	Repeated use of the same consonant sound.
Dialogue	There could be no agreement without further dialogue .
Exclamation	Interjection is an exclamation in speech.
Expression	Freedom of expression is a basic human right.

Genre	The first part of a story where the setting, characters and genre are introduced to the reader.
