

## Spelling list: Double consonants

Double consonants in the middle of a word mark the boundary of two syllables (sum-mer). A double consonant follows the short vowel (fitter).

fitter	My New Year's resolution is to get <b>fitter</b> .
hopping	The frog was <b>hopping</b> across the pond.
stopping	The rubber band around his wrist was <b>stopping</b> his circulation.
swimming	In my leisure time I enjoy <b>swimming</b> .
accommodation	That <b>accommodation</b> was the best.
address	<b>Address</b> the judge as 'Your Honour'.
beginning	My hair is <b>beginning</b> to go grey.
brilliant	I have a <b>brilliant</b> driving instructor.
difficult	The circular road was <b>difficult</b> to navigate.
embarrass	Don't <b>embarrass</b> me in front of my friends.
exaggerate	You <b>exaggerate</b> all the time!
luggage	Her <b>luggage</b> was very heavy.
mammal	The blue whale is the largest <b>mammal</b> .
permitted	Only members are <b>permitted</b> to use the swimming pool.
recommend	I <b>recommend</b> this course to home schoolers.
success	She was a great <b>success</b> as a rock singer.
atmosphere	The earth's <b>atmosphere</b> is one-fifth oxygen.
audible	She spoke so softly that she was barely <b>audible</b> .
beneath	The tourists stood <b>beneath</b> the arch.
