| effect | A rhetorical device, such as a question, is used for effect rather than to get an answer. |
| bawl | The upset baby did nothing but bawl all night. |
| bury | My dog likes to bury bones. |
| brake | The car had to brake hard. |
| break | Be careful not to break that glass. |
| fair | Jane has fair hair. |
| fare | He lost his bus fare and had to walk all the way home. |
| grate | Grate some cheese to go in the sauce. |
| great | There was great relief at the rescue. |
| groan | She keeps moaning and groaning. |
| grown | I have grown tomatoes for ten years. |
| hear | Shout across the valley to hear the echo. |
| ball | He kicked the ball through the window. |
| berry | The holly berry is bright red. |
