

## Spelling list: No need to double (copy)

More examples of the doubling rule: You do not need to double the last letter of a word if: 1) a word ends in two consonants 2) the suffix starts with a consonant

crashing	The waves are <b>crashing</b> on the sea shore.
dampen	This light rain will only <b>dampen</b> the ground.
windy	It is too <b>windy</b> to use an umbrella.
buzzed	A wasp <b>buzzed</b> around my head.
stuffing	The <b>stuffing</b> has come out of my old teddy bear.
checked	They <b>checked</b> the door knob for fingerprints.
locked	Check that the car is <b>locked</b> .
puffy	Her face was <b>puffy</b> from crying so much.
crafty	I don't trust that man as I think he is too <b>crafty</b> .
selfish	Tom was <b>selfish</b> not to offer me a lift.
twisted	The willow trees were twisting in the strong wind.
quickly	Our baby has grown so <b>quickly</b> .
handful	Throw a <b>handful</b> of seeds to feed the birds.
thankless	It was a <b>thankless</b> task.
backless	She wore a <b>backless</b> dress to the party.
thickness	The <b>thickness</b> of my gloves will keep my hands warm.
spotless	I scrubbed the floor until it was <b>spotless</b> .
madness	It's <b>madness</b> to drive so fast near a school.
